LAWMAKERS ENTER FINAL WEEK OF COMMITTEE WORK

Members of the Kansas Legislature are feverishly working to finish their business in the 2024 Session as the final week of committee work looms. Committees are, with some limited exceptions, required to conclude their business by next Friday. Lawmakers will then be on the floor the last week of March debating bills. Conference Committees, where differences between bills are worked between the top three members of a particular committee, will then begin the first week of April.

TAX BILLS BEGIN TO MOVE AGAIN AS SENATE APPROVES SEVERAL ON FLOOR

After the Republican controlled Legislature was unable to override Governor Kelly's recent veto of its single-rate tax package, lawmakers went back to the drawing board and passed several measures late Thursday in the Senate.

Of significance, the chamber was able to pass another single-rate tax [bill](#). The bill provides for the single rate for income tax apportionment which begins at 5.7% and decreases by 0.05% beginning in tax year 2024 through tax year 2029.

Further, the bill provides for an increase in the income limit for exempting social security payments from taxes from \$75,000 to \$100,000. Included in the proposal is a formula to phase out the exemption for over \$100,000. The personal exemption rate would increase, as well as the standard deduction.

The measure is expected to cost \$1.7 billion over three years.

The bill passed [29-11](#) which would enable to chamber to override a potential veto.

Other measures and amendments of note included the following:

- An amendment to [HB 2465](#) which would add language from [SB 8](#) (passed and vetoed in 2023) pertaining to the **Golden Years Property Tax Exemption**. Additional language was amended to increase the maximum income limit to qualify for the program from \$50,000 to \$80,000.
- Language added to [S Sub for SB 60](#) to authorize a four-day **back to school tax holiday** which would include clothing, school supplies and electronics.
- A permanent **tax exemption** added to [S Sub for SB 60](#) for **feminine hygiene products, menstrual products and diapers for infants and adults**.
- [SB 311](#) added **Built to Suit and Leaseback Sales provisions** that proponents say would address the over-valuation of commercial property and opponents argue would artificially deflate the valuation of commercial properties and shift the tax burden on residential properties.

SENATE PASSES \$25 BILLION BUDGET

After hours of debate, the Kansas Senate passed its version of the state's [budget](#). Floor amendments were abound during the debate. Highlights of the budget include the following:

Fiscal Year 2024 - 2025

- \$15.7 million SGF for a **Southwest border mission**. The bill includes language directing that expenditures be made to respond to a request for assistance from the State of Texas pursuant to the Emergency Management Compact and that the Adjutant General collaborate with the Governor to activate, mobilize, and deploy state resources to prevent drug and human trafficking and other crimes contributing to an emergency in FY 2024.
- \$28.0 million, all from federal ARPA funds, for the **2026 World Cup games** for FY 2025.
- \$30.1 million, including \$11.7 million SGF, to continue the **Medicaid add-on to nursing facilities** for FY 2025 based on the number of Medicaid patients served, at a rate of \$10 per Medicaid day.
- \$25.7 million, including \$10.3 million SGF, to increase **physician provider codes** by 8.0 percent.
- \$26.0 million, including \$10.0 million SGF, to increase **personal care services (PCS) rates** on the Brain Injury (BI), Physical Disability (PD), Technical Assistance (TA), Severe Emotional Disturbance (SED), and Intellectual/Developmental Disability (I/DD) waivers.
- \$23.0 million, including \$8.8 million SGF to **increase waiver slots** on the PD and I/DD waivers by 250 individuals.
- \$17.0 million, including \$8.5 million SGF, to develop a new system compliant with federal **Comprehensive Child Welfare Information System (CCWIS)** requirements.
- \$23.2 million, including \$8.9 million SGF, to increase the **supported employment rate** from \$28 per hour to \$35 per hour for the I/DD waiver.
- \$75.0 million SGF to construct a new **cancer research facility at the University of Kansas Medical Center**. Other funding for the facility would include \$43.0 million in federal funding and a \$100.0 million gift from the Sunderland Foundation.
- \$14.0 million for **IT and cybersecurity for state universities** and two-year colleges.

- \$5.0 million, and transfer the same amount from the State Highway Fund to the **Passenger Rail Service Revolving Fund**, to support an intercity rail service, such as the Amtrak Heartland Flyer.
- \$15.0 million, and transfer the same amount from the State Highway Fund to Public Use General **Aviation Airport Development Fund**, to increase support for the Kansas Airport Improvement Program
- \$174.4 million, including \$73.5 million SGF, for a 5.0 percent **state employee base pay increase**. The plan would increase salaries for classified and unclassified employees but would exclude statewide elected officials, legislators, and employees on a formal career progression plan. If approved, the funds would be appropriated and certified for distribution by the State Finance Council.

Fiscal Year 2026 – Fiscal Year 2028

- \$157.4 million, including \$60.0 million SGF to increase **Medicaid outpatient hospital reimbursement rates**.

Amendments made on the floor that passed pertained to items ranging from [legislative pay raises](#) to [340B programs](#). An official summary (without amendments) can be found [here](#). The bill can be found [here](#).

The House is expected to debate its budget next Tuesday. The two sides will then meet to reconcile differences.

MEDICAID EXPANSION TO BE HEARD

Hearings on Medicaid Expansion are finally slated to happen. The [bill](#) will be heard on Wednesday before a joint committee of the [House Health Committee](#) and the [Senate Budget Committee](#).

Medicaid Expansion has been a major point of focus for both the Governor and the Legislature. The Governor has wanted to see the measure passed for years. Conversely, Legislative leaders have been staunch opponents. Kansas is one of just a handful of states that has not expanded healthcare since the passage of the Affordable Care Act in 2010.

BOB BETHELL COMMITTEE CANCELLED

The April 24 meeting of the [Bob Bethell HCBS and KanCare Oversight Committee](#) has been cancelled and will be rescheduled at a later date. The committee, which discusses a variety of issues related to waiver programs and the state’s managed care system, typically meets quarterly. No reason was given for the cancellation.

JOINT TECHNOLOGY COMMITTEE MEETING SCHEDULED; NEW CYBERSECURITY BILL INTRODUCED

The [Joint Committee on Information Technology](#) will meet on Monday. The Committee’s short agenda notes they will discuss “notification and risk-based systems.”

The meeting comes at a time when a new bill has just been released that addresses a number of statutes related to security within the three branches of state government. The [bill](#) language was introduced on Friday and it will have a hearing on Monday in the House Legislative Modernization Committee.

KANSAS INFRASTRUCTURE SUMMIT & BROADBAND PERMITTING WORKSHOP TO BE HELD

Cities, counties, tribal governments, regional planning organizations and the private sector are encouraged to attend the Kansas Infrastructure Summit April 24, 2024 in Salina. The [Kansas Infrastructure Hub](#) will update attendees on the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) funding opportunities, talk about resources

available to help pursue grant funding and deliver projects, and discuss current issues and needs related to BIL.

A registration link and additional information will be available on the Kansas Infrastructure Hub website and distributed via email soon.

The Summit is being hosted by the Kansas Infrastructure Hub. The Infrastructure Hub is Kansas' coordinated approach to identifying best practices from across the nation for deploying funds and maximizing Kansas' BIL opportunities in transportation, energy, broadband, water, and cybersecurity.

Kennedy was a former assistant director for diversity and inclusion at the Missouri Department of Conservation. He has a degree in fisheries biology from the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff.
